



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Message from Brianna

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

Success-Ready Students

We work to prepare every student for short-term and long-term success.

With your support, we partnered with DPS to fill and **distribute 2,000 backpacks to incoming kindergarten students.** The backpacks were filled with books, crayons, coloring sheets, and enrollment information for families.

We provided \$13,000 from the Summer Joy Fund to help more than 200 DPS students attend summer camp for free.

This year marked the second Acceler8 event—a career exploration day for all 8th grade DPS students hosted by DPS, DPS Foundation (DPSF), and local employers.

Over 2,000 8th-grade students learned about different career opportunities in Durham by interacting with more than 70 local businesses.



We then eased the financial burden of college for 23 students by **awarding \$62,500** in scholarship funds.


Empowered Families

Our Family Engagement work focuses on building authentic relationships and meeting families where they are.

More than 30 working-class families attend weekly Sembrando Raíces gatherings. Community partners supported 24 gatherings of Homework con Amigos. Year-round, Latiné parents engage in advocacy efforts to support our public schools.

"Within the (Sembrando Raíces) space, our kids learn to love our culture and learn to appreciate others...It's a space where we feel safe, where what we talk about is safe, and where we respect each other's opinions as well."

We created and disseminated 30 know-your-rights informational packets to school PTAs, with resources to welcome and stand alongside immigrant families. We also supported the "Standing Strong/Estamos de Pie" community art campaign featuring the work of Roan Boucher and other local artists.





We bolstered 25 families experiencing hardship by distributing more than \$10,500 from the Community Support Fund.

Finally, we, in collaboration with community partners, helped more than **71 parents and caregivers learn foundational and advanced digital skills and software needed to support their students.** 70% of participants take the digital literacy class in Spanish, while 30% take it in English.

Supported Educators & Staff

DPS educators and staff are the heart and backbone of our public schools.

In January, we welcomed Durham nonprofit Crayons2Calculators (C2C) as a new DPSF program. Together, we now provide educators a one-stop shop for needed school supplies and resources.





Art Teacher Marisol Perez, of Eno Valley Elementary School, looked through the 20+ pallets of free art supplies Brame donated to Crayons2Calculators.

Out of the 2,362 DPS classroom teachers, not including specialty teachers, at least 2,206 teachers from all disciplines received more than \$105,000 worth of school supplies this year. C2C collects donated supplies from community members and partners.

In March, we launched the DPS Bus Driver Certification Fund to address the bus driver shortage. The fund aims to cover the financial barrier of \$380 in certification costs for 50 interested drivers. As of April, we have raised over \$13,000 to support at least 35 new drivers.

Our school grants support the bold dreams and innovative ideas of educators and staff (as well as students and families) in our school communities. Our cohort model centers on providing our grantees with support, resources, funding, and community.

This year, our awards included:

Glenn Elementary School received an Innovation Grant to gather families to listen to culturallythemed stories and cook traditional foods.



We continued to foster teachers' skills in the Teacher Leadership Academy (TLA). TLA teachers learn about the historical and current systems that create inequities for students and how to address them.

We celebrated Alec Virgil, of Middle College High School at Durham Tech, as Teacher of the Year.

Thriving Schools


In partnership with DPS and Duke Health, WHOLE Schools uplifts feelings of safety, support, and belonging as the essential foundations for learning.

This year, we reached 25 schools and funded 22 projects. At our Model Schools (Neal Middle School and Southern School of Energy and Sustainability), we've supported over 2,200 students and their families and 250 staff members.

16 DPS educators across 10 schools trained to be Mental Health Ambassadors. They learned valuable skills such as how to build healthy relationships and respond to emotional and mental health crises.

DPSF has also increased community members' access to mental health resources by developing a Thrive Guide in English and Spanish that promotes mental health literacy, wellness practices and strategies, and a shared understanding of support pathways.





This year, hundreds of families across Durham's three Community Schools received support for food and clothing insecurity, individualized tutoring before and after school, and activities focused on physical, mental, and social health and well-being. DPS Community Schools currently include Fayetteville Street Elementary, Lakewood Elementary, and Club Boulevard Elementary.

In March, Student U took the helm to manage Durham's Community Schools. This will allow the model to expand within Central North Carolina. Their management will begin this summer.

Connected Community

Through our partnerships with DPS and local organizations and businesses, we seek to build bridges between Durham and our public schools.

In September, we launched our Alumni of the Month (AOM) program to lift up stories of how DPS sets graduates up for enduring success.

Since January, we've trained 37 community members to serve as FAFSA navigators for 66 families and students at 5 school events.

This helped families and students better access financial aid funds they may have otherwise missed.

Over 350 elementary, middle, and high school students performed in front of a packed DPAC auditorium for the 44th annual "An Evening to Shine." This celebration of DPS Arts is a key fundraiser for the Durham Promise Scholarship Fund.

Some attendees were able to enjoy the evening at no expense to them, thanks to 21 donors who contributed \$1,218 to our pay-it-forward fund. We had 16 volunteers sign up to support event setup, offering 54 hours of their collective time.

More than 200 volunteers, including 19 staff-level volunteers, logged at least 2,783 volunteer hours supporting the Crayons2Calculators team.
